Over the weekend, I was able to take in some fun and exciting events in D51. I was also able to participate in the GJHS Farewell event, organized and put on by the GJHS Student Council, and I was able to take in some of the action on the field as our Palisade High School girls soccer team competed at CMU. I love attending these events to not only see our student athletes perform, but also to see the D51 students, staff, and families who come out to support them. Last night, I was able to attend the 31st Annual Masonic Awards Ceremony where students and staff from D51 middle and high schools are honored for their performance, and we were able to honor Sarah Rayside from Rim Rock Elementary School as the D51 Overall Outstanding Teacher of the Year! Congrats to Ms. Rayside and all of the students and teachers who were honored.

Today I was able to make it out to CMU for our Exceptional Rodeo event for our D51 high school students who receive Special Education services to experience the fun of the CMU rodeo! I also was able to meet with my Superintendent Student Advisory Group at Palisade High School for our final meeting of the year. This great group of students gave up their lunchtime to meet with me throughout the year, and I really appreciate them bringing student voice and perspective to important topics in our district.

The students and I continued the conversation about tech use in schools and the impact it is having on our students. As we continue to explore this topic as a district, and look for solutions to address the problem, we will be presenting key data and information at next Tuesday's Board Meeting as we work to update our tech use policy and find ways to better create sustained access to attention-fostering spaces and build spaces that maximize learning and thriving in our schools. If you are a reader, and you want to learn more about this topic, two books that I have recently explored and would recommend are "iGen" by Dr. Jean Twenge and "The Anxious Generation" by Dr. Jonathan Haidt. They both provide intriguing insight into the relationship between the rise in adolescent mental health issues (major depression, anxiety, etc.) and selfharm and suicide rates starting in the early 2010's, and the introduction of the smartphone in 2007 along with greater access to social media apps around 2012. Not only has greater adolescent access to smartphones and social media apps led to greater rates of mental health issues, they have created more distracted children whose minds are "forever elsewhere." Dr. Haidt argues that a "phone-based childhood" vs the former "play-based childhood," and the "great rewiring" of the Gen Z brain has interfered with child development and exacerbated mental health issues. We will dive into this topic more at the upcoming Board Meeting, and in upcoming Friday Updates, as we work together as a school district and community to find solutions to these issues...for our kids.

Just a friendly reminder that there will be **no school tomorrow**, **April 12**, due to our Teacher Compensation Day. This day off is in recognition of the hard work and dedication of our teachers, who are required to stay after their contract hours for parent-teacher conferences each semester.
